As with most industries, there are companies or individuals who find ways to avoid compliance with rules and regulations or disregard them entirely. The trucking industry was rocked in December 2016 when it was discovered that an Atlanta-based DOT certified medical examiner was arrested and charged with issuing false medical certifications to potentially 8,000 commercial truck drivers since 2014.
